Highlight – Care of your orchids during wet weather

The rain recently has invigorated your orchids to produce new growths and roots in abundance and given some respite from our regular watering and fertilising. Most orchids in their natural habitat grow in the rainforest where there are frequent downpours and a predominantly humid environment, but in their natural environment, epiphytic orchids have their roots spread out usually on tree trunks and are exposed to air, they tend to dry off quickly and do not rot between downpours. Also, the breeze following a downpour quickly dries off the plants, preventing collection of water and microorganisms in the crown and other nooks and crevices.

In your greenhouses, extended wet weather can cause issues of rot. Some commonly faced issues our orchids face with long periods of rain are:

Crown rot: This is one of the most common issues faced when orchids are exposed to rain. When the plant collects in the crowns of monopodial plants such as phalaenopsis or vanda orchids, the long exposure to moisture along with the bacteria and fungi that are on the surface of the leaves, tend to create an unhealthy environment for the orchids, where the bacteria and fungi start multiplying due to excessive moist conditions. This leads to rotting of the tender tissue in the crown of the plant. The infection spreads to the other portions of the stem and the plants slowly begins to lose its leaves.

Rotting of leaves: Rain drops often collect in the base of the axil of the leaves. These regions are snugly bound to the stem and allow moisture to accumulate. This again leads to an environment conducive for bacterial and fungal growth. Since the leaves are arranged on either side of the stem or pseudobulb in the case of vanda, phalaenopsis, oncidiums dendrobiums and other such orchids, the infection spreads quickly to the stem and other parts. Sometimes soft water-filled black spots appear on the leaves. If left untreated, they quickly spread and destroy the whole leaf and subsequently the stem.

Root rot: Moisture retentive medium such as sphagnum moss, when added to the potting medium tends to hold copious amounts of water. This is utilised by the plant and the moisture dries off after a couple of days. But when your orchids soak up rainwater, the medium remains damp for prolonged periods, then fungal and bacterial infections become rampant. The roots become soggy and begin rotting. The first sign of root rot is when the leaves become thin and dehydrated despite moisture in the pot. This is indicative of a damaged root system. The infection quickly travels up the foot to the rhizome and the pseudobulbs to cause further leaf and stem to turn yellow and black, and decay.

Rot of new growths: Just as with crown rot, rainwater that remains trapped in new growths of oncidiums and cattleya orchids can also lead to bacterial and fungal rot. As the water travels into the crevices, it collects bacteria and fungi on the surface of the plant and its narrow vertical structure does not allow air to enter and dry up the moisture. The prolonged dampness promotes bacterial and fungal attack on the roots leading to rotting of the delicate tissue. Losing a new growth to rot can lead to setback for the plant as these new shoots are the ones that would mature and bloom in the coming season. Moreover, orchids put out new roots through these new growths. If the orchid doesn't have a healthy root system, then this could prove to be a major setback for the plant. So, these new delicate growths need to be protected from rainfall.

Advantages of rainwater. If there is so much of risk involved then why you should even consider placing your orchids in the rain? Well, for the simple reason that rainwater has multiple benefits on your orchids. **Gympie & District Orchid Society newsletter**

Firstly, it has the right pH of around 6.5, which is suitable for healthy orchids growth and blooming. During rain, Nitrogen and Phosphorus are released and are readily absorbed by the plants resulting in instant greening effect on plants. Rain can also help your dehydrated orchids become hydrated and healthy once again.

While most of your orchids will thrive in the rain, below are six care tips for your orchids during the rainy season:

- 1. Prepare your orchids for the wet season.
 - Remove medium that will give excessive moisture retention (sphagnum moss), which would lead to rotting of the orchid roots and stems.
 - Clean up the leaves of the orchids with a soft cloth and allow them to dry under a fan. This removes any superficial dust and mites.
 - When it begins to rain, cover the new growths to protect them.
 - Tilt the pots slightly to allow excess water to run off along the axil of the youngest leaf to allow minimal moisture to remain the crown, which can easily be dried up by air drafts.
- 2. **Check on your orchids after a downpour.** Check every day for signs of infections and rot. Catching infections early on will help you save your orchids by taking appropriate preventative measures. Look out for soft, damp dark spots on the leaves. This is an indication of leaf rot. Also, yellowing and soft rot in the crown region or the stem indicates crown rot and stem rot, respectively. These require immediate remedial action.
- 3. **Ensure a good wet-dry cycle**. Limit the exposure of your potted orchids to rainfall. Let your orchids reach near dry conditions before allowing them to soak up rainwater again. If they are already moist, do not expose them to rain again as excessive moisture in the medium will promote rotting of roots and new growths. Cover your greenhouse temporarily with plastic to reduce more rainfall reaching your plants.
- 4. **Take quick remedial action if you observe signs of rotting.** Treat them at the earliest sign. In the case of stem, crown and leaf rot, you may have to remove the rotted tissue by cutting or scraping away the affected portion and applying a fungicidal spray.

Another reason for spread of infection can be attributed to the use of unsterilised equipment for trimming your orchids leaves and roots. Always sterilise your cutters regularly.
